Mission:

This Lesson Plan has been developed by the National Museum of Military Vehicles (NMMV) to facilitate scholastic visits to our institution. This Lesson Plan provides instructors with the framework to develop a detailed lesson plan for a field trip to the NMMV, by providing references to Wyoming State educational standards. This Lesson Plan is intended to serve as a starting point, recognizing that every School District has different standards and formats for their Lesson Plans.

Description:

During World War II, propaganda was used to convey a variety of messages to the American Homefront including a scarcity of goods and materials, recruit military and civilian workers, vilify the enemy, preserve morale and promote Patriotism. In this lesson, students will compare and contrast a variety of different examples of American and foreign propaganda. Students will also explore the morality of messaging and discuss a government's obligation to the truth and the consequences of negative propaganda.

Grade Level: K-2

Theme: Understanding how images and symbols communicate messages in history and today

Learning Objectives

Students will be able to:

- Recognize and describe symbols used in posters and signs.
- Identify feelings or actions encouraged by visual messages.
- Create a simple poster that communicates a positive message to their community.
- Understand how people work together during important times in history.

Vocabulary

- **Symbol** A picture or object that stands for something else.
- Message What someone wants to say or share.
- Community A group of people who live and work together.
- **Teamwork** Working together to help each other.

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Materials

- Printed examples of WWII posters (age-appropriate selections) https://www.archives.gov/exhibits/powers-of-persuasion
- Poster paper, crayons, markers
- "Gallery Walk" worksheet with simplified prompts:
 - o What do you see?
 - o What do you think this poster is saying?
 - o How does it make you feel?

Procedure

1. Warm-Up Discussion

Show students familiar symbols (e.g., American flag, recycling sign, school mascot). Ask:

- o What do these symbols mean?
- o Where have you seen them before?

2. Visual Exploration

Share 3–4 simplified WWII posters. Guide students to notice:

- Colors and shapes
- o People or animals
- Words or slogans

3. Group Activity: Gallery Walk

In small groups, students rotate through poster stations and complete a worksheet with teacher support.

4. Class Discussion

- o What messages did we find?
- Why do you think people made these posters?
- o How do we share messages today?

5. Creative Extension: Make Your Own Poster

Students create a poster that shares a helpful message for their school or town (e.g., "Be Kind," "Help Each Other," "Keep Our Town Clean").


6. Gallery Presentation

Students present their posters to the class and explain their message.

Assessment

- Observation during group work and discussion
- Completed Gallery Walk worksheet
- Student-created poster with verbal explanation
